Dear Fellow Residents:

I am proud to present the 6th edition of **Huntington's War Heroes: A Guide to Our Town's Historic Veterans**.

This Guide features articles on four veterans who have left a lasting legacy in our Town: Leo Giovenco, a medic in Liverpool, England who treated wounded army men until he was asked to fight in combat in the Battle of the Bulge;;Salvatore Tomatore, a Navy enlistee who participated in the invasion of Okinawa; Mary Occhiogrosso, who enlisted as a nurse during WWII and cared for wounded soldiers in Iwo Jima; and Margaret "Meg" Galow, who enlisted as a member of the WAVES during WWII and was trained as a nurse in Navy procedures.

Huntington's War Heroes: A Guide to Our Town's Historic Veterans contains a list of veterans from the Revolutionary War, War of 1812 and Civil War who are buried in the Town of Huntington. Also included is a list of all historic cemeteries located in the Town: the name and location of each cemetery, the years in which it was active and the number of residents buried there.

Huntington's War Heroes: A Guide to Our Town's Historic Veterans also contains both an application to include a veteran buried in the Town of Huntington in the Seventh Edition of Huntington's War Heroes and an application to receive the Town of Huntington Veterans Memorial Headstone Marker. Sponsored by Telephonics Corporation, the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs and the Town of Huntington Veterans Advisory Committee, the Memorial Headstone Marker program was begun to acknowledge and commemorate the service of any veteran buried in the Town of Huntington. The marker features a gold plate with the words "*This Memorial Is In Recognition of Honored Service*" as well as the Town of Huntington seal. The marker can be placed adjacent to the headstone and will be free of charge to any resident that completes the application and provides service documentation.

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Huntington's War Heroes:

A Guide to Our Town's Historic Veterans

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MARGARET “MEG” GALOW

1920-2011

Filled with patriotism for her country, Margaret Galow enlisted in the Armed Services in 1944 at the age of twenty-four. She had two brothers in the Army and one in the Navy and she sought to bravely defend the United States. Margaret was a member of the WAVES (Women Accepted for Volunteer Emergency Service), a unit of the United States Navy founded in 1942 during World War II. As a member of this unit, she was sent to Hunter College Boot Camp where she received instruction on routine Navy procedures and techniques for marching and drilling.

Margaret was interviewed by Armed Services personnel and asked how she wanted to contribute. Margaret wished to go into nursing and soon found herself heading off to the Hospital Corps School in Maryland for four weeks of training.

At the Hospital Corps School Margaret learned how to take care of naval patients, give shots, and use massage techniques. Margaret was then assigned to St. Albans Naval Hospital in Queens in the isolation ward. While there, she was infected with German measles and Scarlet Fever. She took a short leave to recover and then returned to the hospital to work in the orthopedic ward. Margaret was then transferred to Samson Naval Hospital in upstate New York. When she wasn't treating patients, Margaret took hitchhiking trips with her friends to distract from the difficult tasks and scenes of the hospital.

In 1946 Margaret was discharged from Samson Naval Hospital, moved back to Long Island and attended nursing school. Margaret worked as a registered nurse and practiced in local hospitals. She married in 1950 and lived with her husband Frederick and three children in East Northport.

Meg Galow was a member of the Women's Committee for the Town of Huntington that designed and worked to develop the women's monument that now stands in Veterans Plaza, located on the front lawn of Town Hall. This memorial with Meg's help and design depicts women in the military displaying their hats of the WWII era. It was dedicated on June 3, 2001. Meg was also an active member of Northport American Legion #694 for many years. She would delight the members with her baked goods at meetings.

Margaret passed away on September 12, 2011 at the age of 91 and is survived by her children Kent, Gordon and Anita and grandchildren Tara, Lisa, Lee and Ben.

LEO GIOVENCO

1925-2013

Leo Giovenco was born in Whitestone, Queens on February 27, 1925. He graduated from Bayside High School in 1943 and was drafted on August 6th of that year. He began basic training at Camp Upton in Yapank and finished his medic training at Camp Grant in Rockford, Illinois. In December of 1943, Leo took a convoy to England for 13 days from Camp Kilmer in New Jersey.

Leo was a medic in Liverpool where he treated wounded army men and outfitted soldiers. Later, he was stationed at the European Theater of Operations U.S. Army in Chelton, England where he was trained as a rifleman and asked by his ranking officer to fight in combat at the Battle of the Bulge in December of 1944.

Leo fought alongside the 8th Infantry Division, First Battalion for the first strike using the 70th tank Battalion. The Battle of the Bulge was later dubbed by the military as “above all, the story of American soldiers”. After the battle, Leo was relocated to a hospital in France for two months because of an injury. When he recovered, he was sent to an army base ninety miles south of Paris near Versailles to again serve as a medic.

Leo was discharged in February 1946. When he returned home he worked at the Harris Corporation and the Sperry Corporation and also worked on guided missile and bombing systems for the U.S. government. He married and lived with his wife Rita in their East Northport home. Leo joined the Northport American Legion Post 694 in 1980 and spent many years as the Legion’s historian and was a member of the Elwood-Commack Memorial Veterans of Foreign Wars (VFW) Post 9263.

Unfortunately, Leo’s army records were destroyed in a fire at the U.S. army’s St. Louis National Records Center. Congressman Steve Israel and his office traced Leo’s records through a hospital in France in order to ensure Leo received his medals. He received the Bronze Star Medal and Combat Infantry Badge in 2004. Leo passed away on October 25, 2013 and is survived by his sister-in-law Rose and his nephew Peter Rao.



MARY OCCHIOGROSSO

1921-

World War II veteran Mary Occhiogrosso was born on July 16th, 1921 in Maspeth, Queens where she lived and went to school prior to entering nurse's training at Flushing Hospital. When the United States entered WWII, Mary decided to enlist to serve as a nurse. Her mother Jenny encouraged her to enter the service for her brother Freddy who was stationed in North Africa so that there would be one more nurse to take care of soldiers like him. Mary was resolved to serve.

Mary earned her nursing degree and entered the army in 1944, where she was stationed at the McCloskey Amputee Center in Texas until she was called upon to go to Seattle, Washington. There, Mary and her fellow nurses boarded a ship heading to Hawaii for basic training where she learned how to clean, take apart and shoot a gun, cliff-jumping and wall-scaling, basic defensive moves and hand-to-hand combat. She was then transferred to Saipan where she worked in a tent hospital and then to Iwo Jima. In Iwo Jima, Mary was in charge of head and neck injuries at the 232nd General Hospital where she bravely and diligently cared for soldiers and prisoners of war.

Mary was crucial in helping soldiers survive both physically and mentally. She kept morale up with her big smile and beautiful singing voice. Much to hers and the troops' enjoyment, she spent many evenings performing for them. She also got to meet Joe E. Brown, Betty Hutton, Gene Autry, Mary Parker and Gene Kelly when they came to perform for the troops.

In recognition of her service, Mary was awarded the bronze star for her work at Iwo Jima, the American Campaign Medal, the WWII Victory Medal, the Asiatic Pacific Campaign Medal and a Meritorious Service Unit plaque. There is also a digital monument in Washington, D.C. dedicated to women of the military, and Mary Occhiogrosso is included in it.

Once she was back home in Maspeth, Mary resumed her nursing career at Horace Harding during the 1950s, left nursing to help with the family business in the 1960's and resumed nursing in the 1970's at French Polyclinic Hospital as the operating room supervisor.

In 1977 she began working at Huntington Hospital where she was in charge of orthopedics following her move to Huntington. Mary also raised two children, William and Mary Anne, in Huntington. After working in Huntington Hospital for nine and a half years, she transferred to Birchwood Health Center as their nursing supervisor and stayed there until she retired at the age of 80.



SALVATORE TORNATORE

1925-2014

Salvatore Tornatore was born in Manhattan on February 12th 1920. Salvatore left high school after three years, eventually finding work in early 1941 as a civilian for the U.S. Navy in Washington. He enlisted in the Navy two years later where he served aboard the USS Gendreau, which escorted ship convoys between Hawaii and the Marshall Islands. In 1995 he participated in the invasion of Okinawa the largest amphibious invasion of the war's Pacific Theater.

Salvatore settled into Brooklyn after his honorable discharge in 1946. He went to work for the Veterans Administration where a friend introduced him to the woman which would soon become his wife. In 1949 Salvatore married Frances Chiovarelli and in 1962 they moved to Huntington Station to live closer to her relatives. Sal's wife passed away in 1994.

Salvatore was a mentor to Disabled American Veterans leader Dennis Krulder. Dennis had organized volunteers to drive veterans without transportation to medical appointments. Christmas mornings typically found Salvatore at the Department of Veterans Affairs Medical Center at Northport, where he was known for distributing donated holiday gifts.

He volunteered with the Disabled American Veterans for Half a Century. He also served on the Town of Huntington Veterans Advisory Board.

In the mid-1970s he retired from the Internal Revenue Service, as an investigator. Salvatore enjoyed fishing in Sheepshead Bay and off of Montauk. He also enjoyed boxing and playing the mandolin. He is survived by longtime companion Tina Catania of Huntington Station.
