

Dear Fellow Residents:

I am proud to present the 5th edition of **Huntington's War Heroes: A Guide to Our Town's Historic Veterans**.

This Guide features articles on five veterans who have left a lasting legacy in our Town: Nathan B. Bruckenthal, a United States Coast Guard Petty Officer who served in Iraq; Michael Colamonico, a Huntington resident, World War II veteran and American Ex-Prisoner of War; Robert "Bob" Grogan, a Northport community leader, past Commander of the Northport American Legion and Korean War veteran; Anthony L. Mangano an Army Reconnaissance, Surveillance and Target Acquisition Specialist who served in Afghanistan; and Thomas Watkins a World War II veteran and part of the legendary "Buffalo Soldiers," unit.

**Huntington's War Heroes: A Guide to Our Town's Historic Veterans** contains a list of veterans from the Revolutionary War, War of 1812 and Civil War who are buried in the Town of Huntington. Also included is a list of all historic cemeteries located in the Town: the name and location of each cemetery, the years in which it was active and the number of residents buried there.

**Huntington's War Heroes: A Guide to Our Town's Historic Veterans** also contains both an application to include a veteran buried in the Town of Huntington in the Sixth Edition of Huntington's War Heroes and an application to receive the Town of Huntington Veterans Memorial Headstone Marker. Sponsored by Telephonics Corporation, the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs and the Town of Huntington Veterans Advisory Committee, the Memorial Headstone Marker program was begun to acknowledge and commemorate the service of any veteran buried in the Town of Huntington. The marker features a gold plate with the words "*This Memorial Is In Recognition of Honored Service*" as well as the Town of Huntington seal. The marker can be placed adjacent to the headstone and will be free of charge to any resident that completes the application and provides service documentation.

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# NATHAN B. BRUCKENTHAL

1970-2004

Nathan B. Bruckenthal, a United States Coast Guard Petty Officer, lost his life serving his country on April 24, 2004. Born on July 17, 1979, Nathan attended Herndon High School in Virginia and was a member of the Navy Junior ROTC. After his high school graduation, Nathan headed to Connecticut to join the Ridgefield Connecticut Volunteer Fire Department. Upon moving to Long Island, Nathan joined the United States Coast Guard in 1998.

Nathan's first duty station was on the Coast Guard Cutter Point Wells in Montauk. During his service in Montauk, Nathan was awarded the USCG Pistol Marksman Ribbon, the USCG Rifle Marksman Ribbon and received a United Commendation Award. During his service in Montauk, Nate requested transfer to Yorktown, Virginia to train as a damage control officer; this led to his next assignment in Neah Bay, Washington, located on the Makah Native American Reservation. While serving at Neah Bay, Nathan volunteered as a police officer, firefighter, emergency medical technician and assistant football coach. During Nathan's service in Washington, he was awarded the Coast Guard Sea Service Ribbon. It was at Neah Bay when Nathan met his wife, Pattie.

Nathan extended his enlistment in the Coast Guard due to his desire to serve his country. He was accepted to the elite tactical law enforcement program and was assigned to *Taclet South*, housed aboard Air Station Miami. While serving in his new position, Nathan was recognized as a leader by his commanding officers and received awards for drug extradition operations and alien interdiction in the Caribbean Sea and eastern Pacific, as well as, the National Defense Service Medal, the Coast Guard Merit Team Commendation and the Global War on Terrorism Medal with oak leaf.

In early 2003, as a result of his unique skills and abilities, Nathan was chosen to be among the first Coast Guardsmen deployed to Iraq during Operation Iraqi Freedom. While serving, Nathan received the Armed Forces Expeditionary Medal and a Combat Ribbon for action in and around the port of Um Qasar. In 2004, Nathan's command staff requested him to volunteer for a second deployment to Iraq in April of that year. Nathan agreed and was redeployed. While serving, Nathan and two U.S. Navy sailors were killed when a suicide bomber attacked their rigid hull inflatable boat. Nathan and his team spotted a suspicious vessel which did not heed their commands. They intercepted the vessel before it could reach the U.S.S. Firebolt, an off-shore oil platform and the oil terminal itself at Khwar Al Amaya in the Northern Arabian Gulf, sacrificing themselves in the process.

As a result of his courage and selflessness, Nathan was posthumously awarded the Purple Heart Medal, the Bronze Star Medal with Valor, the Global War on Terrorism Expeditionary Medal with oak leaf and his second Combat Action Ribbon. Nathan was buried at Arlington National Cemetery. He was the first Coast Guardsman killed in action since the Vietnam War.

When Nathan passed, a fund was established to ensure that his wife Pattie and daughter Harper would be cared for and that they could both pursue higher education. Because of the generosity of so many, the fund has been able to assist many worthy causes in Nathan's name such as: the Coast Guard Foundation; the Wounded Warrior Project; the Center for the Intrepid at the Brooke Army Medical Center; Nate's Open Door Baby Pantry and Exchange; Veterans Moving Forward and more.

The barracks at Station Montauk were renamed *Bruckenthal Hall* and an Operation Iraqi Freedom and Operation Enduring Freedom monument, which honors those who served and bears his likeness, now stands in Northport. *Taclet South* placed a plaque bearing his likeness at their facility. Three coins were minted in acknowledgment of his sacrifice. In 2009, Nathan's name was added to the Surface Navy Association Hall of Fame. He is survived by his father, Ric; mother, Laurie; wife, Pattie and daughter Harper Natalie Bruckenthal.



# MICHAEL COLAMANICO

1921-2013

Michael Colamonico, former prisoner of war during World War II, led a truly remarkable life. A staff sergeant in the U.S. Army Air Forces, Mike served with the 327<sup>th</sup> Bombardment Squadron in the 92<sup>nd</sup> Bombardment Group of the 8<sup>th</sup> Air Force during World War II.



At the end of a 13-hour bombing run on his B-17 bomber, where he was the top turret gunner, Mike was shot down by a German Messerschmidt fighter plane over France on December 31, 1943. After a crash landing, Mike was captured along with three others. He was then taken to Paris and onto Frankfurt, Germany where he was interrogated by the German military.

He described his capture by the Germans as follows:

"They tried to starve us out, they tried to freeze us out, they tried to heat us out but we were trained to tell them nothing but name, rank and serial number and that's all we told them," Mike said. "When you are in captivity your life is on the line every day. The only way you come out with your sanity is to live in hope. Captivity brings out the worst and best in you... We all did the best that we could to stay alive."

Mike spent the next 17 months at the infamous Stalag 17 prison in Austria. As the war progressed, the Russians began to advance toward Stalag 17. German soldiers were fearful of surrendering to the Russians, preferring to be taken into custody by American troops. On April 7, 1945, Mike and a group of prisoners were taken from the prison and were marched towards advancing American troops in Germany. They marched for a month before ending up in Braunau, the home town of Adolf Hitler. It was here that Mike was liberated on May 3, 1945.

Upon returning home, Mike became active in Huntington veterans groups. He was commander of the Long Island chapter of the American Ex-Prisoners of War, a member of the Veterans of Foreign Wars and the American Legion and served on the Huntington Town's Veterans Advisory Board. A successful textile salesman, Mike was known throughout The Town of Huntington as a champion of veteran's issues and a wonderful friend. He died December 27, 2013 at 92 years old. Mike is survived by his wife Lorraine; son Michael; daughter Laura; and grandchildren Francis, Christine, Michael Denis and Christopher.

# ROBERT "BOB" GROGAN

1930-2014

Robert "Bob" Grogan passed away on February 19, 2014 in his 83rd year. Born in Glen Cove on November 23, 1930, Bob served in the Navy from 1951-1952 during the Korean War as a Construction Electrician's Mate Petty Officer Third Class (CEG3). After shipping out from the Brooklyn Navy Yard, Bob was responsible for the power production and electrical work required to build and operate airfields, roads, barracks and hospitals. His work was critical in aiding the American war effort.

After the war, Bob returned to Long Island and on August 27, 1955 married Patricia Cummings. In 1969 Bob and Patricia moved to Northport where he joined Northport American Legion Post 694 and served as Commander in 1992. At Post 694, Bob's commitment to public service was on full display. He was actively involved in the American Legion Boys and Girls State Program which selects High school juniors to participate in a program that explains the rights, privileges, duties and responsibilities of an American citizen. Bob was also integral in the organization of the Cow Harbor Warriors Race, the Veterans Day Cross Country 4K Run at the Northport VA and Pearl Harbor Remembrance Day. 2014 marked six decades of dedicated service as a Legion Member.

Bob Grogan will always be remembered by his fellow members of American Legion Post 694 and throughout the Town of Huntington for his many years of contribution to the community. He is survived by his wife, Patricia; daughters, Jane O'Donnell, Claire Garrick and Gail Grogan; son, Robert Grogan; grandsons, Michael Grogan, Daniel Garrick and Christopher Quinn; and granddaughter, Anna O'Donnell.



# ANTHONY L. MANGANO

1972-2008

Anthony L. Mangano, born on April 12, 1972, was killed on June 21, 2008, along with three other American soldiers, in Kandahar City, Afghanistan when his vehicle encountered an IED and small arms fire.



Anthony first joined the New York National Guard in August of 1991 and served as a drilling member in the 2<sup>nd</sup> Squadron, 101<sup>st</sup> Cavalry until 1994. Anthony re-enlisted with the intention of joining a unit that was going into combat. In February of 2007, he was placed into the C Company 1<sup>st</sup> Battalion 69<sup>th</sup> Infantry, based out of Leeds, Green County. Anthony searched for another unit in need of soldiers for combat, after finding no positions left assigned to war he joined the New York Army National Guard 101<sup>st</sup> Cavalry in Geneva, New York. It was from here Anthony was deployed to Afghanistan to train Afghan police and national army members.

Over the course of his service, Anthony received the National Defense Service Medal, the Afghanistan Campaign Medal, the Army Forces Ribbon, the Combat Infantry Badge, the New York State Conspicuous Service Cross, the Bronze Star, the Purple Heart and the Combat Action Badge. He was also posthumously promoted to sergeant.

Between stints in the military, Anthony worked as a Police Officer in Cairo, New York and operated a construction business in Windham, New York. Anthony obtained an associate's degree from Columbia-Green Community College in Hudson, New York.

Anthony L. Mangano will always be remembered by his fellow soldiers, family and friends as a hard working, dedicated, determined, outspoken and patriotic young man who left us protecting his country and the citizens who call it home.

He is survived by his mother, Constance; sister, Jeanne Renneberg; brother, Michael and wife Tatiana of Sao Paulo, Brazil.

# THOMAS WATKINS

1917-2012



Thomas Watkins was born in Aquebogue, New York in 1917. He was the son of Thomas and Sally Watkins, of Virginia, the youngest of five siblings.

Thomas attended Roanoke Elementary School and Riverhead High School and graduated in 1936. While in high school, Thomas worked as a caddie at the Shinnecock Hills Country Club and the Perkins Hotel in Riverhead. An avid golfer in his leisure time, Thomas caddied for Arnold Palmer, one of the greatest golfers of all time, when he played on Long Island.

Thomas was drafted on November 10, 1942 to Camp Upton, currently Brookhaven National Laboratory. He trained at Fort McClellan in Alabama and Camp Robertson in Arkansas and was assigned to the all-black 92<sup>nd</sup> Infantry in World War II, part of a legendary group of segregated units, known as the "Buffalo Soldiers," that earned them a place of honor in American history. Thomas and his Infantry were stationed 40 miles north of Genoa to fight at the Arno River Crossing and helped to liberate Italy in 1944, distinguishing themselves as some of World War II's bravest fighters.

Thomas was honorably discharged with the rank of Tec-4 in January 1946 after more than three years of service. It was then, in 1948, that Thomas got a job at what is now the Department of Veterans Affairs Medical Center in Northport and moved to Huntington. After retiring from the VA in the late 1960s, he helped set up the FAA Eastern Region Federal Credit Union in Melville, where he worked as a loan officer. Later he took a job with the Department of General Services for the Town of Huntington where he worked for 22 years before retiring in the early 1990s.

Thomas was deeply involved in community organizations, often as a founding member or an elder statesman. He was a Master Mason and charter and lifetime member of the Tyre Lodge No. 91 F&AM in Riverhead, chartered in 1948. In Huntington, he was a lifetime NAACP member and a dedicated, longtime parishioner of Bethel A.M.E. Church, where he served as a Trustee Emeritus, class leader, member of the Tabernacle Choir, Men's Chorus and Lay Organization life member.

He received proclamations from the Towns of Huntington and Hempstead, the state and the federal government for his service during World War II. He even received a birthday card from President Barack Obama, thanking him for his service to this country.

In 1993, Thomas married Emma Alston, whom he met in church some 20 years earlier. He had five children: Ron Alston, Jesse and Karen Klatterbuck, and step-sons Norman and Robert Alston.

Thomas died on January 31, 2012 at the age of 94. His funeral was held at Bethel A.M.E. Church and he was buried in Calverton National Cemetery.
