Gardening Tips!

- The ideal time to transplant seedlings is when they have 1-2 sets of true leaves. At this time seedlings can be thinned out to one healthy seedling.
- Rule of thumb : It's safe temperatures to transplant after Mothers Day.
- Plant stems that can be buried deeply to establish a strong root system include, tomatoes, eggplants, peppers and broccoli to name a few.

What makes the Kubecka Garden Organic?

- The use of chemical pesticides, herbicides, fungicides, and/or chemical fertilizers is prohibited.
- The Town receives donated horse manure. and provides free mulch which can be applied as a natural fertilizer and weed suppressant. Fresh manure should be aged for approximately 4 months before use.

What to Plant?

June is almost over, and you haven't started any vegetables yet! It is not too late! You can research plants to start in June based on Plant Hardiness Zone 7A. TIPS

- Sow directly into ground: sunflowers, nasturtiums, basil, second crop of lettuce, beans, summer squash, cucumber, peas, etc.
- Weed regularly to keep the task easy and manageable

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Reminders:



- Visit your plot often to pick ripened vegetables before they fall on the ground and start to rot. This attracts unwanted pests to your garden.
- Please keep all plants, vines, fruits and vegetables inside your fence line and out of the pathways to allow General Services to keep these paths maintained for easy access.

What to Plant?



- Sow radish, carrots, beets, turnips and kale directly in ground.
- Seeds can continue to be sown throughout July for late crops of beets, bush beans, carrots, chard, summer spinach, cucumbers, and summer squash.

Be on the Look Out for Spotted Lanternfly!



Unfortunately, Spotted lanternfly has been seen in the area. SLF primarily feed on tree of heaven (Alianthus altissima) but can also feed on a wide variety of plants such as grapevine, hops, maple, walnut, and fruit trees. If you encounter this invasive pest kill it! This time of year it is typical to see adults. Adults do not survive the first frost, but their egg masses do. Egg masses can be seen around October and should be destroyed as well. Reporting online at <u>agriculture.ny.gov/SLF</u>

TIPS



- Sow peas, lettuce, swiss chard, and spinach directly in ground.
- Deadhead flowers
- Remove old plants to eliminate disease and shelter for insects.
- Control weeds before they go to seed and spread!

Pre-packaged bags of mulch are available for the taking, with a maximum of ten bags per visit. They also offer free loading of loose mulch into your pick-up or dump truck, with a cover required. Seed Saving 101

Saving your own seeds is easy and incredibly rewarding!

- Start with easy crops like peas, beans, lettuce, and tomatoes.
- Seed maturity is important. Immature seeds will not store well or germinate.
- Dry seeds 1-3 weeks before storing in paper envelopes.
 Plastic can retain moisture and lead to rot.

To Do List for Zone 7A:



- Sow garlic, shallot and perennial onion crop.
- Add manure, compost and leaves to increase the organic content of your garden soil.
- Time to dig up sweet potatoes and cure them before storing!

To Do List for Zone 7A:



- Sow garlic, shallot and perennial onion crop.
- Plant spring flowering bulbs like tulip, daffodil, hyacinth and crocus.
- Drain hoses before hard frost.
- Harvest remaining summer produce before
 a hard frost estimated around Nov. 5th

Reminders!

- November 1st water service will be turned off for the season.
- December 1st garden gates are locked for the season.
- Garden plots should be cleaned out and all personal property removed by end of season.
