Dear Fellow Residents:

I am proud to present the 7th edition of **Huntington's War Heroes: A Guide to Our Town's Historic Veterans**.

This Guide features articles on five veterans who have left a lasting legacy in our Town: Mario Buonpane, an Army Technical Specialist, past Commander of the Northport American Legion and Chairman of the Town of Huntington's Veterans Advisory Board; Andrew Casazza, a member of the Military Police for the U.S. Marine Corps who went on to start numerous youth programs throughout Long Island; Michael Koulermos, a veteran of the U.S. Marines Corps, two-time past Commander of the Northport American Legion and dedicated volunteer for the Northport VA Medical Center; Frank Minnock, a Lieutenant Commander of the U.S. Navy who survived the Pearl Harbor Attacks and became a passionate volunteer for the Disabled American Veterans bus at the Northport VA Medical Center; and Charles Rufino, a decorated veteran of the U.S. Marine Corps who consistently lent a helping hand to his fellow veterans by attending military events and taking photographs.

Huntington's War Heroes: A Guide to Our Town's Historic Veterans contains a list of veterans from the Revolutionary War, War of 1812 and Civil War who are buried in the Town of Huntington. Also included is a list of all historic cemeteries located in the Town: the name and location of each cemetery, the years in which it was active and the number of residents buried there.

Huntington's War Heroes: A Guide to Our Town's Historic Veterans also contains both an application to include a veteran buried in the Town of Huntington in the Eighth Edition of Huntington's War Heroes and an application to receive the Town of Huntington Veterans Memorial Headstone Marker. Sponsored by Telephonics Corporation, the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs and the Town of Huntington Veterans Advisory Committee, the Memorial Headstone Marker program was started in an effort to acknowledge and commemorate the service of any veteran buried in the Town of Huntington. The marker features a gold plate with the words "*This Memorial Is In Recognition of Honored Service*" as well as the Town of Huntington seal. The marker can be placed adjacent to the headstone and will be free of charge to any resident that completes the application and provides service documentation.

MARIO BUONPANE


1931 – 2015

Mario Buonpane was born on December 19, 1931 in Ozone Park, Queens. After graduating from Newtown High School in Elmhurst, New York, Mario was drafted into the U.S. Army. During his years in active duty, Mario served as a Technical Specialist, where he was assigned work on the “Corporal Missile,” the first mobile guided nuclear missile crew that served in West Germany. As a result of Mario’s contributions to this project, Western Europe remained secure and protected during a critical time in the war effort. Following his momentous service, Mario was honorably discharged from the U.S. Army.

Following his honorable discharge, Mario went on to receive a Bachelor of Science Degree in Electrical Engineering and a Master’s Degree in Business Administration from Long Island University. Although he began his career at Potter Instruments in Plainview, New York, Mario later joined the Grumman Corporation, where he spent the duration of his career. He was placed in the Lunar Module division of the historic Apollo space program. While working at Grumman, Mario designed electrical harnesses for both the “Ascent & Descent Stage” of the module. Due to the precision of his designs, the harnesses remained intact on the surface of the moon after the eventual landing and aided the astronauts in their return to Earth from the lunar surface. Mario’s service to Grumman and the Lunar Module project had an immense impact on the success of the Apollo space program and the history of human kind as a whole. As the Apollo program came to a close, Mario continued to work at Grumman as a Procurement Analyst and a Contractor Consultant until the late 1990s. Despite officially retiring from Grumman, this did not stop Mario, as he joined the faculty of Downing College as an Adjunct Professor of Business Administration, teaching courses in Russia and China.

Upon his retirement, Mario dedicated the rest of his life to improving the lives of veterans, students, and community members alike. As a veteran, Mario joined the Northport American Legion Post 694, and went on to hold several leadership positions, including Post Commander and Member of the Board of Directors. One of his crowning achievements was restoring the once-dilapidated Northport VA Hospital Golf Course, which continues to generate revenue that ultimately benefits veterans at the VA Hospital. He also served as Chairman of the Legion’s “Boys State” Selection Committee, where he greatly increased participation. This program allows students to engage in a mock government, and inspires a sense of civic duty and patriotism. Mario also played an instrumental role in the founding of the Town of Huntington’s Veterans Advisory Board. As Chairman of the Board, Mario worked tirelessly to create “Veterans Plaza,” which features monuments that list the names of Huntington residents who have served in the U.S. Military. Because of Mario, countless families and visitors are able to honor veterans and pay their respects.

Mario once told his children, “A job worth doing is a job worth doing well.” This is exactly what he did throughout his entire life and the Town of Huntington will be forever grateful for his service and contributions. Mario passed away after a courageous fight with cancer on September 7, 2015 at the age of 83 and is survived by his wife, Beatrice, his children Karen, Nancy and Mark and grandchildren, Vincent and Joseph.



ANDREW “ANDY” CASAZZA

1929 – 2015

Andrew Casazza was born on April 5, 1929 in Brooklyn, New York. Andy enlisted in the U.S. Marine Corps when he was only 15 with his mother signing permission. He served two years during World War II in 1944 and was stationed in the Marine Corps base in Quantico in Virginia, serving on the Military Police. Unfortunately, Andy’s mom died at the age of 36 while he was still on active duty. He fulfilled his promise to his mom and Andy finished his high school education after returning from his two year tour of duty. He applied for the GI bill and attended St. Francis College in Loretto, Pennsylvania. He returned to Brooklyn after graduating with a Bachelor of Science in Social Work and a minor in History.

Andy began his work career in the Brooklyn District Attorney’s office. After successfully applying for a fellowship, he went on to attend Fordham University where he earned a Master’s Degree in Psychiatric Social Work. Soon after, he met and married his wife, Jean, and they settled in Smithtown to raise their family. They eventually made Huntington their official home in the 1980s.

As a resident of the Town of Huntington, Andrew realized he needed to take action and intervene in a time when racial tensions, crime and youth boredom were at record highs. Andrew used his platform as Director of Community Resources for the Town of Huntington to create youth programs that did more than simply provide an outlet for recreational activities. These youth centers enabled students of all ethnicities to come together and defy the cultural norms of the time period. He sought to foster an environment that combined fun activities with counseling, sports, volunteering, and college preparation in the hopes of reducing the number of adolescents on the streets. As a result of his vision, six of these youth centers still exist today. Andrew went on to work as a Deputy Commissioner in the Suffolk County Department of Social Services, a post which he held until his eventual retirement in 1991.

Andrew Casazza was a true visionary and is often referred to as the father of youth services on Long Island. Andrew passed away on November 14, 2015. He was a beloved husband of the late Jean, a loving father of Suzanne (fiance Alexander Munro), Christopher (Sabine) and Brian (Nancy) and cherished grandfather of Shannon, Alexa and Breanna.



MICHAEL KOULERMOS

1931 – 2016

Mike Koulermos was born in April 1931 and raised in Brooklyn, New York. In February 1949, Mike enlisted in the United States Marine Corps in Brooklyn. As a teenager, Mike valiantly served in the Korean War until 1952, when he was honorably discharged in San Diego, California. At the time of discharge, Mike was a Private First Class. After Mike was discharged, he returned home and received a High School Diploma. During this time, Mike decided to join his father at the family restaurant to lend a hand in the kitchen. When Mike's father passed away, Mike took the reins and ran the restaurant. Later in life, Mike traded in his apron for paint brushes and became a painter.

Mike's wife Marion commented that the Northport American Legion Post 694 and the Northport VA Medical Center were Mike's "home away from home... he loved his fellow veterans." Mike was a three-time past Commander of the Legion in 1981, 2000 and 2001. Because of his extraordinary culinary skills, Mike was affectionately referred to as, "The Greek." Leading up to events such as the Legion's annual Super Bowl party or summer barbecues, Mike coordinated and prepared the food. During the event, Mike was always found behind the grill flipping steaks, burgers and chicken. He loved to serve his fellow veteran brothers and bring a smile to their faces. Even when he was not in the best of health, Mike found a way to make it to the Legion to visit or donate his time, as it brought him a tremendous amount of joy. Mike was honored by Post 694 last February to commemorate his incredible dedication to the Legion.

Friends describe Mike as someone who always went out of his way to help the community, and, in particular, the veteran community. He frequently volunteered his time and talents at numerous events for veterans and local children throughout the Town of Huntington. There was seldom a parade where Mike was not volunteering or marching with Post 694. For many years, Mike "set the standard" for the care of veterans at the Northport VA Medical Center. He was known to coordinate donation drives and collected detergent, coffee and other personal items for sick and hospitalized veterans. After doing all of this, Mike still found the time to personally deliver these items to remind veterans they were not alone.

Throughout his life, Mike always had a huge smile on his face and was passionate about each cause in which he was involved. Mike passed away on January 26, 2016 at the age of 83. He is survived by his loving wife, Marion, children, Nancy (Jim), Michael, Chris (Dottie), Peter (Linda) and George (Laurentia), ten grandchildren and three great-grandchildren.



FRANCIS “FRANK” MINNOCK

1919 – 2015

Frank Minnock was born on September 19, 1919. Frank's life is one marked by service to his nation. As a member of the U.S. Navy, Frank served in three wars during his distinguished thirty-year tenure in the military: World War II, Korea and Vietnam. A defining moment in Frank's career came on December 7, 1941 while aboard the U.S.S. Helena in Pearl Harbor. While getting dressed in the morning, Frank heard a voice come over the loudspeaker proclaiming, “ENEMY PLANES ATTACKING FORD ISLAND. THIS IS NO DRILL.” Before he knew it, he witnessed enemy planes ruthlessly bombing American ships, and was catapulted into action. After courageously fighting on that fateful day in December, Frank survived to fight another day.

No sooner than eighteen months later, the newly refurbished Helena was hit again during the Battle of Kula Gulf. The ship immediately began to sink and Frank was luckily rescued by a nearby ship. He was soon transferred to the U.S.S. Houston. Frank was propelled into yet another crisis when this ship was attacked by torpedoes during the Battle of Formosa. Although Frank lost many of his close friends during these attacks, he never forgot them, but rather was inspired to honor their memories by serving his country in two subsequent wars.

Frank was honorably discharged from the U.S. Navy in October 1945. He went on to study Accountancy at St. John's University after obtaining funding from the GI Bill. Frank decided to re-enlist in 1947, serving in both the Korean Conflict and the Vietnam War. He ultimately retired from the Navy in 1970 as a Lieutenant Commander, and settled down with his family in East Northport. Driven by his love of automobiles, and, in particular, his 1967 Mustang, Frank became a Parts Manager at a number of dealerships in the Town of Huntington. When Frank eventually retired from his work in the automobile industry, he still felt a burning desire to give back to the veteran community. Frank volunteered as a driver for the Disabled American Veterans (DAV) bus at the Northport VA Medical Center. He often woke up at “the crack of dawn” to transport disabled veterans to their various appointments.

Frank passed away on May 23, 2015 at the age of 95 after battling pneumonia. Frank's life would not be complete without his wonderful family. He met his wife, Eleanor, when she was only 16 years old and knew they were destined to be married after their very first date. They went on to raise a beautiful family and a very large extended family. He is survived by his wife, Eleanor, children, Francis B. (Kathy) Minnock, Kathleen J. Wirth, Eileen M. Dohrman, Eleanor (Hal) Minnock-Pugh, and Christopher J. (Jennifer Kranzle) Minnock, eight grandchildren and nine great-grandchildren.



CHARLES RUFINO

1924 – 2016

Charles Rufino was born on July 7, 1924 in San Juan, Puerto Rico. After moving to the United States at a young age, Charles grew up in Brooklyn, New York. He enlisted in the Marine Corps on December 13, 1942 and reported for basic training at Parris Island in January 1943. By October 1943, Charles made his way to Camp Catlin in Oahu, Hawaii, a place which is commonly known as Pearl Harbor. While stationed at Pearl Harbor with the Fourth Division, Charles and his fellow Marines prepared by unloading truckloads of ammunition and other supplies.

In February 1944, Charles was part of the invasion fleet to hit Roi-Namur Island in the Kwajalein atoll. Dodging explosions and gunfire, Charles made his way to cover. But, his division was soon hit with an aerial bombardment by Japanese pilots, forcing them division to depart for Eniwetok for a clean-up campaign. His division later returned to Camp Catlin at Pearl Harbor for more training and preparation. In January 1945, he joined the Second Marine Division at the Marianas Islands at Saipan. Here, he was in a grave registration unit and was part of the contingent that secured the island. Charles then spent 30 days aboard a ship at the southern end of Okinawa in the hopes of reaching Saipan. During this period of time, he and his fellow Marines went to great lengths to fight back against Japanese aggression and Kamikaze pilots. When World War II ended, Charles returned stateside, and was finally discharged on January 22, 1946.

As the Korean War began, Charles re-enlisted to the Marine Corps Reserves on October 13, 1947 and was later called up when war broke out. It was around this time that Charles met and married his wife, Ina. Despite reporting for active duty, the train carrying Charles and his fellow Marines was wrecked in Louisiana, and thus, his deployment was delayed until after his enlistment was completed. At that point, Charles decided to return home to his loving wife. Charles and Ina went on to raise a beautiful family in Dix Hills. As a professional photographer, Charles opened up his own store in Brooklyn and always went out of his way to help others, even when he was not in the best of health. Oftentimes, Charles volunteered to take photographs at events such as the Jones Beach Air Show and the Long Island Fall Festival and printed them at his own expense to bring joy to his fellow veterans.

Charles remarked that serving as a member of the United States Marine Corps was a continuous source of pride and honor throughout his entire life. He once said, "Nothing else I have done in this life has brought me this kind of attention from people I have never met...it is very rewarding and gratifying." As a result of his courageous service, Charles was awarded the following decorations: Good Conduct Medal, American Campaign Medal, Navy Occupation Service Medal with Asia Clasp for service in Japan (1945), Asiatic-Pacific Campaign with 3 invasion campaigns (Roi-Namur, Saipan, Okinawa), World War II Victory Medal and the Korean War Service Medal. Charles passed away on March 12, 2016 and will always be remembered for his service. He is survived by his wife, Ina, and three children, Charles Jr., Giovanni and Elena.
