Dear Fellow Residents:

I am proud to present the 3rd edition of **Huntington's War Heroes: A Guide to Our Town's Historic Veterans**.

This Guide features articles on five veterans who have left a lasting legacy in our Town: Peter MacDonald Campbell, a Marine Corps veteran of Pearl Harbor and posthumous Huntington High School graduate; Hewlett J. Long, a Civil War veteran who was Captain of Company K in the 127th Regiment of the New York City volunteers; Jacobus Nostrand, Revolutionary War veteran and one of 437 Huntingtonians who signed the "Association"; Jacob Conklin Walters, the namesake of a Grand Army of the Republic post formed by local Civil War veterans from the Cold Spring Harbor/Huntington area; and John Woolsey, an active member of the Presbyterian Church in Huntington Village, local business owner and Revolutionary War veteran.

Huntington's War Heroes: A Guide to Our Town's Historic Veterans contains a list of veterans from the Revolutionary War, War of 1812 and Civil War who are buried in the Town of Huntington. Also included is a list of all historic cemeteries located in the Town: the name and location of each cemetery, the years in which it was active and the number of residents buried there.

Huntington's War Heroes: A Guide to Our Town's Historic Veterans also contains both an application to include a veteran buried in the Town of Huntington in the Fourth Edition of Huntington's War Heroes and an application to receive the Town of Huntington Veterans Memorial Headstone Marker. Sponsored by Telephonics Corporation, the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs and the Town of Huntington Veterans Advisory Committee, the Memorial Headstone Marker program was begun to acknowledge and commemorate the service of any veteran buried in the Town of Huntington. The marker features a gold plate with the words "*This Memorial Is In Recognition of Honored Service*" as well as the Town of Huntington seal. The marker can be placed adjacent to the headstone and will be free of charge to any resident that completes the application and provides service documentation.

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Huntington's War Heroes:

A Guide to Our Town's Historic Veterans

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PETER MACDONALD CAMPBELL

1923-1943

Peter MacDonald Campbell was born in Scotland in 1923, moved to Huntington as a child and attended Huntington High School. He was well respected among his peers and was a popular football player who had a love for the outdoors and hunting. Just months after the attack on Pearl Harbor and a few weeks prior to earning his high school diploma, Campbell enlisted in the United States Marine Corps.

Upon enlisting in the Marines, he traveled to Parris Island for training. Shortly over a year after his enlistment, Campbell was sent to Empress Augusta Bay in the Pacific with the Marine Corps' Third Division. His assignment as a first scout was to plan and construct a landing strip for American fighter planes. It was there that Private First Class Campbell was struck by enemy fire and pronounced dead. He was one of 423 casualties at Empress Augusta Bay and was only twenty-years-old.

While overseas, Campbell sent many letters home that showed his love for Huntington. In his last letter, Campbell said, "You know, I thought I'd be the last one in this world to miss the old school. I guess it's the company of all the kids I miss most, and the football games." He then spoke about why he needed to go overseas, saying, "So the people all over the world can keep going to schools like H.H.S. [...] And so that kids can go to these football games free of fear and oppression."

On May 5, 1944, Huntington High School dedicated an elm tree and a plaque in his honor. Sixty-five years later, the Huntington Town Board replanted the tree and rededicated the plaque to show due respect to this fallen hero. At the ceremony, a posthumous high school diploma was presented to Peter's family.



HEWLETT J. LONG


1827-1899

Captain Hewlett J. Long was born in Huntington in 1827 to James Long and Sarah Rusco. A hard-working man, Long grew up in Huntington where he worked as a carpenter for several years. He then joined a grocery business on Wall Street and ultimately joined the army.

In September 1862, during the Civil War, Long enlisted as a first lieutenant in Company E, 127th Regiment, New York Volunteers. Nearly two years later in May 1864, he was promoted to captain and assigned to Company K of the same regiment.

Throughout his tenure fighting for the Union forces, Long fought in countless battles including the siege at Suffolk, Bills Island, Fort Johnson, Stoney Hill, the Charleston & Savannah Railroad and Gregory's Landing. While captaining Company K, he was wounded during the Battle of Salkahatchie, a hard fought battle in the river and muck of South Carolina.

After returning home, Long continued to honor his country and fellow veterans by serving on the Board of Directors for the Soldiers and Sailors Memorial Association. Formed in 1886, the Soldiers and Sailors Memorial Association raised funds to create a memorial for the Townsmen whose lives were taken during the Civil War. In addition to the Soldiers and Sailors, Long was a member of the J.C. Walters Grand Army of the Republic Post 64, named after Jacob Conklin Walters who was one of the first Huntingtonians lost in the Civil War. In 1899, Hewlett J. Long passed away at the age of 71.



JACOBUS NOSTRAND


1742-1814

Jacobus Nostrand was born in Huntington in 1742. On February 16, 1764, he married Phebe Whitman and they had four children: Elizabeth, Mary, Abigail, and James.

On May 8, 1775, Nostrand was one of 437 Huntingtonians who signed the "Association". The "Association," a declaration drafted by the Provincial Convention of New York, was a list of grievances against the British Parliament's procedure of government intervention. In the document, the Colonists expressed concerns regarding the Parliament's method of raising revenues and their disapproval of the shutting down of the Port of Boston.

Nostrand's military service began in September 1775, when he enlisted as a private in the Huntington Militia. As a member of the 8th Company of Colonel Josiah Smith's 1st Suffolk County Regiment of Minutemen, commanded by Captain Thomas Wickes, Esq., Nostrand saw action in the Battle of Long Island. Upon defeat, Thomas Wickes' Company was dissolved in the summer of 1776. Nostrand returned home to Huntington where he and his family rode out the remainder of the British occupation. He passed away on August 19, 1814, amongst family, at the age of seventy-five.

Nostrand became somewhat of a Huntington legend because of his service in the Revolutionary War, and his legacy prevails to this day. The Nostrand Cemetery, named in his honor and located on the grounds of what is now Five Towns College, is where he rests alongside other veterans and family members. According to a 1922 article in the *Long-Islander*, the former Burr's Lane Junior High School held Memorial Day exercises at his grave in which he was praised for being a Revolutionary War hero. The Town of Huntington maintains the cemetery so that Nostrand's life can be remembered for generations to come.



JACOB CONKLIN WALTERS

1826-1862

Jacob Conklin Walters was born in 1826 and grew up in Cold Spring Harbor. He married Eliza Jane Cheshire in 1856 and they had two children, Ida and Carrie. Walters enlisted as a sergeant in the 102nd Volunteer Regiment, Company C and became a dedicated soldier during the Civil War. Walters was one of the first casualties of the Civil War from Huntington.

In March of 1862, Walters' regiment left Brooklyn along with eight other companies en route to Washington. After crossing the Potomac, Walters and the troops marched to Langley, Virginia, where they were stationed and prepared for battle for ten days before returning to Washington. That May, his regiment joined the Army of Virginia along with General Banks' Union forces and on August 9, 1862 they went off to fight in the Battle of Cedar Mountain.

During the battle, General Stonewall Jackson's Confederate forces squared off against General Banks' Union forces. Walters' 102nd Regiment led the Union attack at the eastern gate. Though outnumbered, they exploited Jackson's troops during brutal hand-to-hand combat. One veteran described the fight as, "unsurpassed for ferocity by any other engagement during the war." Eventually, the Confederate Army prevailed and 314 Union soldiers were killed. One of those soldiers was Jacob Conklin Walters.

After the war, local veterans from the Cold Spring Harbor/Huntington area formed a Grand Army of the Republic post named in Walters' honor. His name is also listed on the memorial tablet over the fireplace at the Soldiers and Sailors Memorial Building.



JOHN WOOLSEY

1761-1850

John Woolsey was born on March 22, 1761 in Connecticut. At the age of fifteen, he joined the Revolutionary Army as a fifte major.

After years of dedicated service in the War, Woolsey settled in Huntington, married Phoebe Rogers, and fathered twelve sons. Woolsey was an active member of the Presbyterian Church in Huntington Village for approximately fifty years. Woolsey ran a grocery store in Huntington located on the street that has since been named in his honor.

In 1811, his wife Phoebe died and Woolsey moved back to Connecticut where he twice remarried, first to Elizabeth Schofield with whom he had a daughter, Hannah, second to Sarah Reed. He and Sarah stayed together until her passing in 1848 upon when he moved back to Huntington to spend his remaining years with his children.

Upon his death in 1850 at the age of 89, the *Long-Islander* published his obituary stating that, "Mr. Woolsey was one of the few who lived among us as the representative of past generations." The *New York Journal of Commerce* also published a piece on him, praising Woolsey for being, "One of the relics of the brave old days, and with an unfailing memory and clear intellect. [...] He was a valuable citizen, and in every aspect a noble specimen of the men of 1776. Tall and commanding in appearance, and universally respected, he honored the country he fought hard for, by an upright life, and has left an example to this age which is not to be disregarded." He is now buried in the Woolsey cemetery alongside his first wife, children, and other veterans of the Revolutionary War.
